WOODCRAFTERS CLUB OF TAMPA, INC. Meeting Minutes, October 20, 2005

Vice-president Joe Jennings in Almand Hall of the Broad Street Baptist Church called the October meeting of the Woodcrafters Club of Tampa to order at 7:05 pm with 33 members and guests in attendance. First-time visitors at this meeting were Rocco Zannino and Don Salisbury.

The minutes for the September 15th meeting were accepted and approved as published in the October 2005 Bluechipper. The treasurer's report as filed by Treasurer Bill Smith was also approved as published reporting a balance of \$3049.77.

Vern Blackadar reported on the need for members participating in the Fine Handcrafted Furniture Division at the Florida State Fair to be aware of the 5 pm December 16, 2005 deadline for entry applications.

Vern also advised that the Woodworking Events Show sponsored by MINI MAX USA would be held on Nov. 18-19-20 at the Florida State Fair grounds. Bruce Clark showed off a wooden tool chest that he had created.

Program

The program for the evening was brought by George Dinsmore, who demonstrated to the membership some of the procedures and considerations involved in the making of an item that requires a bridle joint. A bridle joint is defined as one that unites the end of one piece of timber with the side of another, the former having a deep groove or recess cut across the end, leaving two tongues that fit into recesses or notches cut in the edge of the second timber.

The end project for this demonstration was a pedestal bar table.



It was shown how one could prevent major problems in the construction of an unfamiliar project by confirming the construction technique with a small prototype done in some inexpensive wood.
